INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT ON THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

December 17, 2021

To the Board of Trustees of The Salt Lake City Mission and the Blessed/Anointed Public

Report on the Financial Statements

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the Salt Lake City Mission (a Christian Community Development Organization, a Gospel Rescue Mission Church, a Not For Profit Organization) which comprise the statements of financial position as of September 30, 2021 and 2020, and the related statements of activities and changes in net assets, cash flows and the functional expenses for the years then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditors' Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditors' judgment including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, weather due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessment, the auditor consider internal control relevant to the entities preparation and fair presentation to the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entities' internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes an evaluation of the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluation of the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for the audit opinion.

Note 1: Background of the Organization:

The Spectacular Ministries of the Lords' Servants was approved by the Utah Division of Corporations Department of Business Regulation as a Utah Corporation on April 16, 1986.

The Spectacular Ministries of the Lords' Servants founded the Salt Lake City Mission (SLC Mission) in 1993 as a Non-Denominational Christian Gospel Rescue Mission Church that serves the entire Salt Lake Valley communities. As a Church, the SLC Mission is recognized by the United States Treasury Internal Revenue Service (IRS) as a 501 (c) (3) tax-exempt organization. The SLC Mission is part of "City Gate Network" formerly the Association of Gospel Rescue Missions since 1997. The "City Gate Network" Association of Gospel Rescue Missions is a 405 plus member international organization which is North Americas oldest and largest network of independent faith-based crises shelters and rehabilitation centers offering hospitality to all peoples in the name, blessing's and anointing's of the Lord Jesus Christ.

The SLC Mission is a not-for-profit organization, (a Christian Community Development Organization / an Inner-City Gospel Rescue Mission Church), which operates an inner-city rescue mission, ministry and church. The SLC Mission ministers in Salt Lake City to men, women and children confronting homelessness, poverty, disenfranchisement and substance dependencies. The extended COVID 19 economic crisis is requiring the SLC Mission resources to reach the working poor and American Veterans daily, as well as the homeless. The SLC Mission provides hot meals and a food pantry, food box distribution, emergency shelter, clothing, blankets, sleeping bags, hygiene items, crisis intervention and counseling, literacy education, job placement, emergency health and dental referrals, computer/internet/ software/communications access and long-term recovery and discipleship programs.

The recovery discipleship programs include the Inner-City Men's Home (The Up-Word Motion Program) and the Rural Ranch Men's Home (The Second Chance Ranch). The SLC Mission provides the logistics support for the immediate consumption/distribution of surplus/expired food commodities and new/used clothing to the most in need in the Salt Lake City communities. The SLC Mission also interfaces and coordinates its efforts and resources with other Salt Lake City communities, organizations and citizens to achieve the maximum help and results for the homeless men, women and children it serves, blesses and anoints in the name of the Lord Jesus Christ.

Note 2: Summary of Significant Accounting Polices and Basis of Financial Statement Presentation:

The significant accounting policies and basis of financial statement presentation enhance the usefulness and provide full disclosure and transparency of the organization's financial results to the enlightened reader of the financial statements.

Notes to the Financial Statements

Note 2: Summary of Significant Accounting Polices and Basis of Financial Statement Presentation: (continued)

Basis of Accounting

The SLC Mission is required to report information regarding its financial position and activities according to two classes of net assets: unrestricted and restricted. Donations received are recorded as unrestricted or restricted support depending on the existence and/or nature of any donor restrictions. Assets received with restriction, whose restrictions are met in the same year they are received, are reported as unrestricted net assets. For the years presented, the SLC Mission has had only unrestricted net assets. The accounts of the SLC Mission are maintained on the accrual basis in accordance with the principles of fund accounting for Not-for-Profit organizations.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash includes checking, debit cards, savings and money market deposits in interest and non-interest-bearing accounts with financial institutions. The Deposits are with FDIC insured banks, which may be limited to \$200,000 insured deposit on each specific banking account.

Marketable Securities

Marketable Securities include marketable equity stock securities. These investment securities are recorded at the lower of cost or fair market value at the statement of financial position date. As of September 30, 2021, and September 30, 2020, the cost of the equity securities approximated fair market value. The securities valuation is recorded as donations at market valuation at donation date per major American stock exchanges.

Inventories

Inventories include donated items such as food, new and used clothing, household furniture/appliances and personal hygiene items used in the operations of the SLC Mission's programs. Inventories also include inventory items held for resale, which at September 30, 2021 and September 30, 2020 were \$46,349 and \$41,844, respectively. When inventory items held for resale are sold the proceeds are utilized for operating expenses of the SLC Mission. The value of inventory is recorded at its estimated fair value at the date of donation using a nationally accepted computer software database of approximate valuations.

Land, Buildings and Equipment

Land, buildings and equipment are recorded at cost when purchased or, if donated, at the estimated fair value at the date of receipt. Depreciation is provided using the straight-line method over the following estimated useful life of the SLC Mission's fixed assets:

Buildings and Leasehold Improvements

10 - 35 years depreciation life.

Machinery/Equipment, Furniture and fixtures

5 - 10 years depreciation life.

Vehicles

3 - 5 years depreciation life.

Note 2: Summary of Significant Accounting Polices and Basis of Financial Statement Presentation: (continued)

Depreciation expense for years ended September 30, 2021 and September 30, 2020 was \$29,244 and \$29,244, respectively.

The SLC Mission reports gifts of land, buildings and equipment as unrestricted support unless explicit donor stipulations specify how the donated assets must be used. Gifts of long-lived assets with explicit restrictions that specify how the assets are to be used and gifts of cash or other assets that must be used to acquire long-lived assets are reported as restricted net assets and support.

Contributions

Donation income is recorded when received or ownership of donated assets is transferred to the SLC Mission. Donor restricted contributions are recorded as revenue in the temporarily restricted class of net assets until the funds have been expended by the SLC Mission for the purposes specified by the donor. Donated materials, including gifts-in-kind, are recorded at estimated fair value. Donations of marketable securities are recorded at market value on the date of receipt into the brokerage account of the SLC Mission or lower of market value at the date of the financial statement preparation. The SLC Mission records income and expense for contributed professional services at the fair market value of the billed and contributed invoice for the number of hours and services contributed by the professional services firm. Donations of food, clothing and other consumables in excess of the requirements of the SLC Mission's clients are contributed to or traded with other relief organizations to avoid waste. Certain donated items are held for resale and the proceeds of which go to offset SLC Mission program expenses.

Functional Expense Allocation

The full cost of providing various program services and supporting activities have been summarized on a functional basis in the statement of functional expenses. Accordingly, certain costs, such as depreciation, salaries and benefits, occupancy and office costs have been allocated among the services and supporting activities benefited based upon management estimates.

During the fiscal years ended September 30, 2021 and September 30, 2020 the SLC Mission incurred funding development costs of \$266,904 and \$234,610, respectively, for information materials and funding development expenses. These materials included brochures, direct mail letters and radio/TV/billboard advertisements. The SLC Mission Funding Development Ministry continues at a substantial level to offset the American economic downturn, COVID 19 and to prayerfully serve, anoint and bless the continued increasing homeless populations during the current prolonged economic crises.

The food, clothing and other inventory at September 30, 2021 and September 30, 2020 includes \$46,349 and \$41,844, respectively of inventory items held for resale, which will be utilized for asset conversion to cash to meet the operational requirements of the SLC Mission.

In-kind contributions – Donated goods are recorded at their estimated fair value when received. The Organization has a substantial number of volunteers who have donated significant amounts of time in program services, administration, and fundraising. Contributions of services are recognized if the services received create or enhance nonfinancial assets, require specialized skills, are provided by individuals possessing these skills, and would typically need to be purchased if not donated. The Organization did receive specialized trade services during the years ended December 31, 2020 or 2019 in the amount of \$245,875 and \$205,985, respectively.

Note 5: Operating Line of Credit

Aa of September 30, 2021 the SLC Mission has an available line of credit and revolving credit cards from Wells Fargo Bank for \$99,000, which is unsecured. The credit lines bear interest at 8.75% on September 30, 2021 and is due on demand. The line of credit balance as of September 30, 2021 and September 30, 2020 was \$89,189 and \$80,135, respectively

Note 6: Long-Term Debt

Long-Term Debt consists of Notes Payable, which were used to purchase a four-plex men's home and a Payroll Protection Program COVID 19 loan used in the SLC Mission programs at September 30, 2021 and September 30, 2020, are as follows:

Note 7: Operating Leases

The SLC Mission rents real property in connection with its Mission operations and office facilities. Rents are \$3,510 per month for office space and SLC Mission operations facility. The terms of the lease are renewed annually and on June 1, 2021 for a one-year term. Rent expense for the years ended September 30, 2021 and September 30, 2020 was \$41,008 and \$38,838, respectively

Note 8: Investments, (Community Development, Rescue Mission Investments)

Assets and liabilities are recorded at fair value and disclosed using a three-level hierarchy. The classification of assets and liabilities within the hierarchy is based on whether the inputs to the valuation methodology used for measurement are observable or unobservable. Observable inputs reflect market—derived or market—based information obtained from independent sources while unobservable inputs reflect estimates about market data. The fair value hierarchy prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value into three broad levels:

Level I – Quoted prices are available in active markets for identical investments as of the measurement date. The SLC Mission does adjust marketable securities to the lower of cost or market price at time of purchase or donation.

Level II – Pricing inputs are observable for the investments, either directly or indirectly, as of the measurement date, but are not the same as those used in Level I. Fair value is determined through quoted process in markets that are not active; or other inputs that are observable or can be corroborated by observable market data.

Level III – Pricing inputs are unobservable for the investment and include situations where there is little, if any, market activity for the investment. The inputs into the determination of fair value require significant management judgment and estimation.

In many cases, a valuation technique used to measure fair value includes inputs from multiple levels of the fair value hierarchy. The lowest level of significant inputs determines the placement of the entire measurement in the hierarchy.

The investments classified as Level II are marketable equity securities which are traded on small imperfect trading exchanges and have been written down to net realizable market value of the last recorded trade. The investments classified as Level III property are Ranch Land, Real Estate and Mission working Assets which are recorded at the cost of acquisition, fair market value at the time of purchase/donation of the land and assets.

Note 9: Liquidity, Funding Availability and On-going Contributions.

The SLC Mission continued operations and services are dependent on the continued ongoing support from public and private funds that support services for the homeless and low-income individuals, children and families who the SLC Mission serves, blesses and anoints.

The SLC Mission has various sources of liquidity at its disposal, including cash and cash equivalents and donor contributions. In addition to financial assets available to meet general expenditures over the next 12 months, the SLC Mission operates with a balanced budget and anticipates collecting sufficient donor contributions to cover general expenditures not covered by donor-restricted resources.

Note 10: Non-operating Losses (Marketable Securities)

The SLC Mission received gifts of in kind marketable common stock securities of \$13,000 during the year ended September 30, 2011 and \$200,000 during the year ended September 30, 2002. Certain marketable common stock securities have investment community-imposed restrictions, which limit the timing of the sale of the marketable common stock securities. The common stock securities have been written down to a market value of \$5,500 and \$5,500, respectively as of September 30, 2021 and September 30, 2020. During the fiscal year ended September 30, 2011 a non-operating loss on marketable securities was recognized in the amount of \$8,500.

Note 11: Contingencies

The SLC Mission has no recognized contingent liabilities, uncertain financial transactions, financial guarantees or pending litigation matters which would result in any additional liabilities.

Note 12: Federal Income Tax

The SLC Mission is a church and as such is recognized as a 501 (c) (3) not-for-profit corporation as defined by the IRS. The SLC Mission has not had any unrelated business taxable income and has not owed Federal income tax.

Note 13: State Income, Sales, Franchise and Local Property Taxes

The SLC Mission is a church and as such has received an exemption from the State of Utah Tax Commission for Utah State sales, use and franchise taxes. The SLC Mission applies for a Tax Exemption Credit for Sales Tax paid, annually. Utah Sales Tax Refunds for the years ended September 30, 2021 and September 30, 2020 were \$720 and \$787, respectively. The SLC Mission paid County Property Taxes to reimburse services provided, for the years ended September 30, 2021 and September 30, 2020 amounts paid were \$-0- and \$7,941, respectively

Note 14: Conflict-of-Interest Policy

It is the policy of the SLC Mission that all officers, directors and committee members shall avoid any conflict between their own individual interests and the interests of the SLC Mission. The SLC Mission has a conflict-of-interest policy whereby board and committee members must advise the board of any direct or indirect interest in any transaction or relationship with the SLC Mission and do not participate in discussions and decisions regarding any action affecting their individual, professional or business interests.

Note 15: Related Parties

The governing powers of the SLC Mission are vested in the Board of Trustees and they govern over all the affairs of the SLC Mission. The Administrative staff oversees on premises, the day-to-day operations and delegate authority to agents and volunteers as needed for the safe, effective and efficient operation of the SLC Mission.

The SLC Mission Board of Trustees is served by the Pastor and Associate Pastor of the SLC Mission. The Pastor and Associate Pastor also serve as the Executive Director (Officer) and Deputy Executive Director (Officer) of the SLC Mission, respectively.

Note 16: Use of Estimates in the Preparation of Financial Statements

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities; the disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements; and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the relevant period. Actual results could differ from the estimates. Accounting estimates are presented to enhance the comparative presentation of the financial statements.

Note 17: Reclassifications

Certain amounts in the September 31, 2020 financial statements have been reclassified to conform to the September 31, 2021 presentation with no effect on previously reported changes in net assets.

Note 18: Subsequent Events:

Subsequent events have been evaluated by management through December 17, 2021 which is the date the financial statements are issued to the blessings and anointing's, nutrition and clothing of the deserving Public.
